**Paradise Lost,** *John Milton* (poetry) Epic story of heaven and hell.

**Gulliver's Travels,** *Jonathan Swift* (novel) Scathing satire of humanity.

Jane Eyre, Charlotte Brontë (novel) Classic story of struggle and triumph centring on a young Victorian governess.

**The Woman in White,** *Wilkie Collins* (novel) Tale of woman in peril, with an *amazing* villain.

**Middlemarch**, *George Eliot* (novel) A finely crafted exercise in humanity and empathy.

**Murder on the Orient Express,** *Agatha Christie* (novel) The clue's in the title.

**Rebecca**, *Daphne du Maurier* (novel) Masterful tale of suspense surrounding a new marriage and the ghost that will not leave them alone.

**The Talented Mr Ripley**, *Patricia Highsmith* (novel) Larks a-plenty in the seductive tale of a suave, charming serial killer.

**One Hundred Years of Solitude,** *Gabriel Garcia Marquez* (novel) A magical story of the history of Macondo and its founding family.

**Collected Poems,** *Philip Larkin* (poetry – several editions available) Odd but beautiful – another voice of the twentieth century.

**The Complete Dramatic Works of Samuel Beckett**, *Samuel Beckett* (drama) Weird, thought-provoking, great.

The Secret History, *Donna Tartt* (novel) Group of students find themselves part of Ancient Greek cult at university – riveting stuff! (If you like also read The Goldfinch)

**Arcadia**, *Tom Stoppard* (drama) Heart breaking drama considering the relationship between past and present, order and disorder.

**Selected Poems,** *Tony Harrison* (poetry) Extraordinary work from one of the finest poets of the twentieth century.

**The Sisters Brothers,** *Patrick deWitt* (novel) Western-inspired story about siblings who question their serial killer dayjobs.
